

DR. GEORGE BARNA

The Barna Group/Metaformation

George Barna is a professor at Arizona Christian University and leads the Cultural Research Center based at the university. His focus at ACU is worldview assessment and development, and cultural transformation.

He was the founder and leader of both The Barna Group (which he sold in 2009) and the American Culture and Faith Institute (which closed in 2018). He has also been the President of Metaformation, a research and communications company, since 2009. Through those entities he has conducted groundbreaking research on worldview, cultural transformation, ministry applications, spiritual development, and politics. In addition to providing research and strategy

for several hundred parachurch ministries, thousands of Christian churches, the U.S. military, and numerous non-profit and for-profit organizations, he has conducted polls and provided strategy input for four presidential candidates.

His work is frequently cited as an authoritative source by the media. Barna has been hailed as "the most quoted person in the Christian Church today" and has been named by various media as one of the nation's most influential Christian leaders.

After graduating summa cum laude from Boston College, Barna earned two Master's degrees from Rutgers University and received a doctorate from Dallas Baptist University.

George and his wife Nancy attended high school and college together before marrying in 1978. They have three adopted daughters and three grandchildren, and live on the central California coast. Over the years he has visited more than 30 countries and flown more than two million miles. He enjoys reading novels, performing and listening to music, viewing fine art, rooting for the Yankees and Lakers, and experiencing the ocean.

Dr. Barna will address the convention in General Session I on Thursday at 8:00 AM and General Session II on Thursday at 3:00 PM.







DON AND LORI RUSSELL



Mr. Jonathan Davis



Mrs. Kellie Moore


